You will be required to attend 3 meetings per year, in person. There is an expectation that documents are read in advance. Training and support is readily available and can be undertaken at a time that suits you. Woodland Grange's Key Stage Two children have participated in the National Poetry Competition run by Poetry By Heart.

From the children selecting their poems in January, practising ready to perform, March when in-school winners were selected by a panel of judges, to July and the Grand Finale Celebration at Shakespeare's Globe, it has been lovely to see the children enjoy and embrace Poetry across Key Stage Two.

To celebrate the efforts of all the children, the classes have all received poetry books to continue to build their love for words. From their 16 entries, one child made it to the National Final, representing Leicestershire in the Classic two-poem competition. The school secured 10 tickets to take a group of children down to London to experience the PBH celebration and support their peer. Sporting Moments

Woodland Grange have been able to celebrate some real successes this year in sport and were incredibly proud to be asked by Hussein Khan, Partnership Development Manager to present a workshop on 'Inspiring, Developing and Excelling through PE, School Sport and Wellbeing Conference' on 6th June. Being able to share good practice with other schools was a really positive experience. The school introduced a new PE curriculum in February 2023 that we can already see having an impact. Teachers have found this easier to implement, the activities are far more developmental and the children have really engaged more with the lessons.

Having Mr Berridge at Woodland Grange to support Mr Evans has meant that we are able to support children more effectively in class and widen the clubs offer before and after school. The school have introduced more supported break and lunchtimes to help keep children physically active and playing through their free play.

It was wonderful to see all of this extra work and dedication recognised at the South Leicestershire School Sports Partnership annual awards with Mr Evans winning the 'Sports Coach of the Year' award.

A pupil was also recognised as 'Primary Sports Performer of the Year' for excellence in swimming at a county and regional level. The awards were presented by a special guest, Laura Sugar, a Paralympian canoeist. She delivered such an inspiring speech about facing challenges and never saying no to things – you don't know what doors

they might open!

Predict Ask your child to predict what they think is going to happen next.

Build reading together into your daily routine. Find a quiet, comfortable place to read together away from any distractions.

Ask about their opinion of the book. Discuss story, style likes and dislikes.

Try to connect the story to your child's own world.

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Reading at Home With Your Child

If it is the same book, ask your child to recap what has happaned so far. Recal

If it is a new book, start by looking at the cover, title, pictures and blurb.

Check their understanding of the book. Ask questions -Why..? How..? Who..? When..? Where..? What..?

If your child mispronounces a word, do not interrupt. Allow them time to selfcorrect.

Discuss and research the meaning of any unfamiliar words or phrases.
